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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The Sydney Morning Herald (page 6) reports that Health Minister Mark Butler's expanded
 portfolio will oversee about \$220 billion in annual spending, which is more than a quarter of the
 federal budget. New NDIS Minister Jenny McAllister will manage daily responsibilities, and both
 will join next month's initial meeting with state disability ministers.
- <u>The Australian</u> (page 1) reports that the NDIA is manually auditing NDIS provider Maysan Holdings following allegations of funds misuse, false claims and collusion with doctors to make fraudulent reports to increase funding.
- The Australian (page 5) reports that prostate cancer is the most expensive cancer in Australia, costing \$1.8 billion annually, including \$644 million spent on medicines under the PBS. Doctors and patients are calling for a national register to track prostate-specific antigen test results to improve early diagnosis.
- <u>The Australian</u> (page 5) reports that Australia's Privacy Commissioner Carly Kind has warned GPs against using AI scribes to monitor and analyse conversations with their patients, amid concerns over potential misdiagnosis, litigation and the hacking of confidential health data.
- <u>The Daily Telegraph</u> (page 9) reports the TGA has received more than 40 ophthalmic disorder reports from Ozempic and Wegovy users since December 2020. The Royal Australian College

of General Practitioners said the reports highlighted the need for individuals to maintain regular contact with their GP to manage their medications and symptoms.

- The Courier Mail (page 15) reports that the Queensland government did not increase the wage
 offer to nurses and midwives, and warned that those who will take protected industrial action
 may lose two months of back pay. The QNMU will launch a strike ballot this week and stated
 the offer "does nothing to recruit, retain and respect Queensland's nurses and midwives."
- The Age (page 5) leads coverage reporting that the Victorian budget will include an additional \$9.3 billion over the next four years for hospital operating costs as part of a wider \$31 billion investment in the health sector. Health Minister Mary-Anne Thomas said the state government would continue to focus on "opening new hospitals, delivering better care and backing our health workforce". Number of mentally ill Victorians killing parents doubles as health reforms stall

The number of parents killed by their mentally ill children has more than doubled in the four years since Victoria's mental health royal commission, as key recommendations intended to prevent such tragedies remain stalled.
