- The Sunday Mail Adelaide (page 1) reports Horizon SolSolutions is facing further legal action
 as a South Australian family seeks over \$4.5 million in unpaid commission payments for
 providing homes for Cocoon SDA, while Horizon has filed a counterclaim disputing the
 allegations.
- <u>7news.com.au</u> reports Health Minister Mark Butler has said increasing access for women's
 health and increasing capabilities for GPs to diagnose and treat issues such as chronic pelvic
 pain and endometriosis is a priority for the Federal Government in an interview with 7NEWS. Mr
 Butler also discussed the need for increased policy benefits from private insurers for lower tiers
 amid maternity ward closures and additional funding for mental health services and ovarian
 cancer as the government seeks to combat medical misogyny.
- The Sun Herald (page 1) reports health experts and industry groups have called for further research into stenting as a treatment for chronic pelvic pain following promising results in treating PCS in several studies and amid growing awareness about the prevalence of the issue, affecting up to 25 per cent of Australian women.
