- The Australian (page 1) reports that Health Minister Mark Butler said negotiations on the NDIS "foundational supports" will be finalised over the course of the year and it is tied together with the multi-year hospital funding agreement. Mr Butler said the NDIS eligibility remains unchanged, following concerns about participant reassessments.
