- Radio National features an interview with Health Minister Mark Butler discussing the closure of Healthscope, an ATAGI review into recommendations for the measles vaccine, rising bowel cancer rates in young people and a new strain of Covid, with Mr Butler urging Australians to receive a free Covid booster as cases of the new variant increase. Mr Butler said they will not bail out the overseas owners of Healthscope but assured Australians that he is working with the receivers to ensure a sale to a responsible operator, while noting that hospitals will operate as usual in the meantime.
