- <u>The Australian</u> (page 3) reports that medical researchers in Australia have identified a link between organ failure and long Covid, in a study that has implications for people who suffer strokes and heart attacks as scientists look to develop better treatments.
- The Australian (page 3) reports that world-first research led by the Melbourne-based Peter Doherty Institute have made a significant step towards an HIV cure, which involves delivering an mRNA-based therapy direct to cells, with the breakthrough being made while working on a therapy for Covid-19.

Eli Lilly Australia's Mounjaro (tirzepatide), a medication commonly used for the management of type 2 diabetes and obesity, has now been approved by the Therapeutic Goods Administration (TGA) for the treatment of moderate to severe obstructive sleep apnoea (OSA) in adults with obesity.
