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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The Australian (page 1) reports that the Family Court has ruled in favour of a father who sought to delay his child's gender-affirming treatment, criticising the treatment model of the Melbourne's Royal Children's Hospital and the Australian Standards of Care and Treatment Guidelines for not recognising children's capacity to make life-altering medical decisions.
- The Canberra Times (online) reports that the Coonamble Aboriginal Health Service is under investigation for allegedly misusing grant funding for overseas trips. Minister for Health and Ageing Mark Butler confirmed that his department was investigating the matter, but emphasised that the majority of Aboriginal Medical Services offer "outstanding" care for Indigenous Australians.
- The Herald Sun (page 1) reports that a parliamentary inquiry into Ambulance Victoria, investigating a toxic culture, poor management, and burnout, has begun in secret, in a move that has angered some of the agency's employees.
- The Australian (page 5) reports that Queensland nurses and midwives wore pink and distributed pamphlets to their patients as part of their industrial action on Thursday, warning that protests would continue in the weeks to come unless the Crisafulli government fulfils its election promise to provide nurses with nation-leading pay and conditions.

- <u>The Courier Mail</u> (page 3) reports that two more locally acquired malaria cases have been identified in Far North Queensland, bringing the state's total number of yearly infections to 71.
- <u>The Sydney Morning Herald</u> (page 3) reports that NSW Police Minister Yasmin Catley stated that police cannot be expected to regulate the growing tobacco black market, after Treasurer Jim Chalmers said that the federal government would not consider reducing the tobacco excise.
