### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

- The Australian (page 7) reports that the NDIA has been criticised by dietitians and
  physiotherapists, who said clients were being denied essential support, resulting to more
  people with disability turning to hospitals "as they have nowhere else to go in the community."
  This was after Health Minister Mark Butler appeared to have step back from the planned July 1
  start of the "foundational supports" rollout.
- <u>The Daily Telegraph</u> (page 4) reports that New Zealand's Associate Minister of Health Casey
  Costello said the country's cigarette smoking decline is due to its regulation of vaping products,
  and criticised Australia's response to illicit tobacco. Health Minister Mark Butler said the
  smoking and vaping laws are effective and focused on "making sure young people didn't get
  addicted to vapes."
- The Australian (page 7) reports that professor Toby Coates, director of kidney and pancreas islet transplantation at the Royal Adelaide Hospital, presented results from a three-year trial using NovoSorb BTM, an artificial skin polymer developed by former RAH Burns Unit director John Greenwood, that may offer a potential cure for Type 1 diabetes.
- The Sydney Morning Herald (page 3) reports the NSW government will allocate \$492 million in the 2025–26 state budget to build a modern Health Pathology Statewide Hub in western Sydney, replacing the outdated Westmead Hospital laboratory.
