Interview with Monash University health economist Dr Sean Docking on corporatisation in Australia's medical imaging sector. Dr Docking's research found that three in five private radiology clinics in Australia are owned by for-profit corporations. He says there are concerns that business interests can affect clinical decisions, outcomes and costs – for example by incentivising overservicing – but more research is needed. He says private equity activity loads the sector with debt and risk, raising fears of failures like Healthscope's. He says that being primarily funded by Medicare, these corporations should be transparent and accountable.
