EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The [Daily Telegraph \(page 1\)](#) reports that Australian pharmacists sold an average 5932 vapes per month between October 2024 and April 2025, making up a fraction of the ten million vape sales per month. Health Minister Mark Butler said that the seizure of eight million vapes was proof that vape legislation was effective.
- The [Sydney Morning Herald \(page 3\)](#) reports that the Grattan Institute's specialist fees report has called for GPs to receive written advice from specialists to avoid unnecessary referrals and for removing Medicare rebates for specialists who charge excessive fees. Health Minister Mark Butler said upgrades to the Medical Costs Finder website could help improve doctor-patient transparency.
- [The ABC \(online\)](#) reports that experts and parents have called for expanded support for parents facing postnatal depression, with up to 100,000 families affected per year. A spokesperson for the Department of Health said that the federal government is spending up to \$43 million over the next eight years to develop 20 perinatal mental health centres.
