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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- <u>The Mercury</u> (page 9) reports that new data shows only one in 1,686 vape sales occur legally through pharmacies without prescription, and the Department of Health has confirmed it has no documents of feasibility study or modelling before launching the pharmacy-only vape scheme. Health Minister Mark Butler earlier said that the vaping laws are working and they have "choked off supply at the border, seizing more than 8 million vapes." *Also reported by: The Canberra Times, ABC Online*
- <u>The Australian</u> (page 24) reports that Melbourne-based medtech start-up IMRA, founded by Professor Tony Costello, has developed hyper-realistic surgical models as alternative to using animals or cadavers in surgical training. IMRA also developed an AI-powered algorithm with the CSIRO and RMIT to asses a surgeon's skill.
- The Herald Sun (page 2) reports that Christina Lackmann, an aspiring cancer researcher, died from caffeine toxicity after waiting more than seven hours for an ambulance.
