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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The <u>Australian Financial Review</u> (page 6) reports that federal Health Minister Mark Butler has said a decision by the ACT Labor government to levy a public hospital tax on Canberra households should be viewed as separate from the Commonwealth, which, he says, has boosted funding for the territory's hospital system by 16 per cent.
- <u>The Age</u> (page 1) reports that a cyberattack has leaked sensitive health information and private details belonging to patients of a cardiologist who works at the Epworth and Royal Melbourne hospitals, alongside running a private clinic.
- The <u>Adelaide Advertiser</u> (page 1) reports that South Australian Premier Peter Malinauskas has warned the state's finances could be at risk if it agrees to a demand by 500 public hospital doctors for a 30 per cent pay rise over three years.

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Private hospitals win boost as insurers lift payouts

The federal government has intensified its focus on the financial sustainability and modernisation of Australia's private hospital sector, warning private health insurers that further inaction on benefit payments to hospitals could trigger regulatory intervention.
