

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The Australian (page 1) reports that the consideration of public funding for weight-loss drugs is being pushed by the Federal Government. Health Minister Mark Butler wrote to the chair of the PBAC in March to request advice on equitable access to medicines for the treatment of obesity in Australia.
- The Australian (page 2) reports that pressure on US President Donald Trump is being
 increased by US pharmaceutical manufacturers as the President intends to take action against
 Australia over its \$18 billion federal medication subsidy scheme.
- The Australian (page 3) reports that new research has found that older Australians with
 anxiety disorders have better recovery outcomes using psychological therapy in comparison to
 taking medication. The study found on average 53 per cent of older people recovered from their
 anxiety disorder after receiving cognitive behavioural therapy, compared to 36 per cent after
 medication treatment.
- <u>The Australian</u> (page 3) reports that a form of immunotherapy has proven highly effective at curing certain blood cancers. The theory has only been tested in pre-clinical animal trials.
- The <u>Courier Mail</u> (page 5) reports that next week thousands of nurses and midwives will strike in Queensland as the state government failed to meet their deadline on a pay deal.
- The <u>Courier Mail</u> (page 16) reports that Queensland's flu season has officially begun, with doctors warning the worst is yet to come as flu cases in the past six months pass the total

number recorded in 2024. More than 5300 cases have been recorded in the past fortnight.

- The <u>Daily Telegraph</u> (page 16) reports that from September, general practitioners will be able
 to resupply ADHD medications. From today GPs can express interest in ongoing training on the
 NSW Health website.
- <u>National Indigenous Times</u> (online) reports that the Northern Territory government's decision to commission a dedicated Incident Management Team (IMT) to respond to the syphilis outbreak has been welcomed by the Aboriginal Medical Services Alliance Northern Territory. "Syphilis is a serious public health issue that has quietly worsened for more than a decade," said Barbara Molanus, Sexual Health Coordinator at AMSANT.
