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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- <u>The Age (page 1)</u> reports that some patients that are refused access to the Victorian voluntary assisted dying scheme have refused food and water to accelerate the death process, coming as permits issued for VAD rose by 50 per cent from 2021-22 to 2023-24.
- <u>The Australian (page 2)</u> reports that a joint investigation between the AFP, Austrac and the Therapeutic Goods Administration has led to the closure of the Wenyun Yan's digital vape marketplace ivapeman.com, with the TGA also investigating wholesale distribution to tobacconists across Sydney.
- The <u>Hobart Mercury (page 2)</u> reports that the Therapeutics Goods Administration has seized two batches of counterfeit Botox at the border, with the TGA investigating further.
- The <u>Herald Sun (page 3)</u> reports that a \$2.2 million Victorian Government immunisation program for respiratory syncytial virus will be available for public sector residential or Aboriginal community-controlled aged care services in the state.
- <u>The Age (page 5)</u> reports that the Victorian Office of the Public Advocate has found that delays, unscrupulous operators and weak safeguards in the National Disability Insurance Scheme have pushed participants into extended guardianships.
- The <u>Herald Sun (page 6)</u> reports that a study by the Burnet Institute has found that administering vaccinations during emergency outbreaks of diseases such as cholera, ebola and measles reduce deaths from illness by up to 60 per cent.
