- **[The Guardian](#)** (online) reports that Cancer Council's latest Generation Vape research shows that vaping among 14 to 17-year-olds fell from 17.5 per cent to 14.6 per cent since the start of 2023. Health Minister Mark Butler said, "Our education and prevention campaigns as well as support to deter people from taking up vaping and smoking or to quit are making a difference."

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## New app aims to prevent falls

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### Court orders owner of alleged illegal tobacconists to close businesses for six months

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## Vapes more effective quit-smoking aid

Vapes containing nicotine are more effective for quitting smoking than nicotine lozenges and gum among adults experiencing social disadvantage, according to researchers from the National Drug and Alcohol Research Centre (NDARC) at UNSW Sydney. Adults from less privileged backgrounds are more likely than other social groups to smoke and typically have a harder time quitting, the study team noted, and hence suffer the most from the health and social impacts caused by tobacco.

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## Ten million Australians living with multimorbidity
