

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The Australian (page 1) reports that the National Disability Insurance Agency has called for
 Health Minister Mark Butler and NDIS Minister Jenny McAllister to remain on timeline for NDIS
 rollouts despite the lack of support from the disability community.
- <u>The ABC (online)</u> reports that the Therapeutic Goods Authority and Australian Border Force have seized over 10 billion vapes since the implementation of a ban at the start of 2024, with an estimated value of \$500 million seized. Federal Health Minister Mark Butler has said the introduction of import controls on vaping products have contributed to the decline in the youth vape rate.
- The <u>Courier Mail (page 1)</u> reports that Metro North hospitals in Queensland have postponed all non-emergency surgeries for 48 hours after emergency departments reached capacity due to rises in flu and Covid-19 admissions.
- The Age (page 1) and the Herald Sun (page 1) report that in a study published today, Australian and UK-based researchers used a three-person IVF technique to avoid children born to mothers with mitochondrial DNA mutations from inheriting disabilities or dying; local regulators do not currently issue licenses for the procedure.
- <u>The Age (page 1)</u> reports that the Australian Labor Party and the Coalition have offered bipartisan support for the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme, coming as the US Government threatened to implement a 200 per cent tariff on Australian-manufactured medicines.

 how a man died to bat lyssavirus despite being treated with an prophylaxism immunoglobulin
 injection by health officials over eight months ago, questioning how the injection failed to work.
- The Australian (page 7) reports that the Australian Medical Association and other health bodies have called for the Federal Government to offer subsidised respiratory syncytial virus vaccines to aged-care residents, coming as 15,000 Australians over 65 contracted the virus this year.
- The <u>Adelaide Advertiser (page 10)</u> reports that the Australian Nursing and Midwifery
 Federation have called for the South Australian Government to end internal ramping in hospital
 emergency departments and to mandate 24/7 senior clinician rostering to assist with patient
 discharge.
- <u>The ABC (online)</u> reports that general practitioners have welcomed changes that allow them to diagnose ADHD in Australians, but have warned that patients will still be charged with out-of-pocket costs unless changes are implemented that would increase rebates for longer consultations.
- The ABC (online) reports that a Queensland research team has discovered that administering a TB vaccine directly into the lungs of a patient could deliver stronger protection to the disease, coming as 189 Australians in North Australia contracted the disease in 2023.
