

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

- The Australian (page 5) reports that the National Disability Insurance Agency yesterday stated that it stands by advice handed down to Health Minister Mark Butler and NDIS Minister Jenny McAllister that the agency remains committed to current timelines for NDIS reform.
- ABC Radio Adelaide reports that Health Minister Mark Butler has said that the lack of
  expansion of aged-care facilities is preventing older patients from being transferred out of
  hospitals and that the Federal Government had passed legislation in December that would see
  aged-care providers access financing for expansion.
- The <u>Courier Mail (page 1)</u> reports that a whistleblower from the Royal Brisbane and Women's
  Hospital has said that 47 inpatients were placed in a corridor to deal with an influx of fluaffected patients, and that only seven patients were in a fit enough state to be there.
- The <u>Hobart Mercury (page 3)</u> reports that the Australian Medical Association has called for the Federal Government to legislate a tax for added sugars in food items, a total of 50c per 100g of added sugar, to curb rising obesity and diabetes rates.
- The <u>Herald Sun (page 5)</u> reports that the Victorian Healthcare Association has found that the state faces a critical health worker shortage and has called for long-term federal and state funding arrangements to allow the state to address increased healthcare demands.
- <u>The Australian (page 7)</u> reports that Private Healthcare Australia has put forward a maternity care proposal that would see prices slashed by 30 per cent for private-sector pregnancy care

and birth services, with midwife births costing around \$500.

- The <u>Daily Telegraph (page 9)</u> reports that a NSW man who had recently died of bat lyssavirus
  was reportedly sent home after seeking treatment at the Ballina Base Hospital as the hospital
  did not have the vaccine necessary for treatment; NSW chief health officer Kerry Chant has
  been appointed to oversee the investigation into his death.
- <u>The ABC (online)</u> reports that the Australian Medical Association has said that Western Australia may be enduring its worst flu season in five years, with the WA Health Department recording over 13,000 cases of influenza so far in July.
