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Ballarat clinic saves \$500,000 for patients with bulk billing

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NT clinicians facing higher costs and shortage of lifesaving rheumatic heart disease drug

The escalating shortage of a lifesaving rheumatic heart disease medicine is causing 'deep concern' among Territory health services, despite NT Health stating access to treatment is not impacted. However Aboriginal Medical Services Alliance Northern Territory (AMSANT) said in July, it was announced with "no warning" that the supply of Extencilline from a French supplier was depleted.
