

### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

- The <u>Daily Telegraph</u> (page 12) reports that out of the over 1600 aged care and NDIS patients currently in the NSW public hospital system, 1131 have remained hospitalised beyond their estimated discharge date, with many waiting for the Federal Department of Health to organise funding or a care home before being discharged. A spokesperson for Health Minister Mark Butler said that the Federal Government is working with the NSW Government to understand barriers to discharge for older patients and to develop solutions.
- The <u>West Australian</u> (page 1) reports that elderly patients wait an average of fourteen days
  after being medically discharged to be transferred to an aged-care service. The WA
  Government has called on the Federal Government to do more on aged-care hours.
- The <u>Herald Sun</u> (page 6) reports that the Victorian Government has entered into a \$5 million deal with BioNTech and the Peter MacCallum Cancer Centre to launch a new clinical trial platform, which would provide cancer patients with access to new treatment options.
- The <u>Courier Mail</u> (page 7) reports that the Australian Cancer Research Foundation Centre for Optimised Cancer Therapy will open in Brisbane today, which will use advanced genomic technologies to analyse how tumours react to treatments.
- The <u>Canberra Times</u> (page 9) reports that WorkSafe ACT has issued up to 80 improvement notices and five prohibition notices to the Canberra Health Services in the last five years, with

only a single one still in place as of August 1, 2025. Since late 2023, a sharp rise in assaults against Canberra ED staff has been recorded.

- The <u>West Australian</u> (page 12) reports that the latest data from the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare has found that there are 9467 people in Western Australia that were identified as homeless with a further 13,142 at risk; there has been a 150 per cent rise in the number of homeless women since April 2022.
- <u>The ABC</u> (online) reports that a survey conducted by both Jean Hailes for Women's Health and Migraine and Headache Australia have found that one in three Australian women experience migraines, worse than the previously estimated 20 per cent.
- <u>The ABC</u> (online) reports that figures from the World Health Organisation suggest that cases of dengue fever in the Pacific are at their worst since 2016, with up to 19,000 cases recorded last month. A mosquito release program using Wolbachia bacteria in Far North Queensland was effective in reducing transmission, but the same method may be challenging to replicate in the Pacific region.

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# Australian consumers unlikely to see US beef on supermarket shelves as giants support local farmers

Australia's major supermarkets and fast food chains have no plans to stock beef from Canada or Mexico and slaughtered in the US, despite the Albanese Government lifting a long-standing import ban last month. The Federal Government last month controversially ended a 22-year-old ban on beef from Canadian and Mexican cattle slaughtered in the United States, declaring the move followed a decadelong scientific review and posed no risk to food safety.

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
