

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The Sunday Mail Brisbane (page 19) reports an unexpected increase in demand has resulted in a shortage of chickenpox vaccines, causing up to a five-month delay for adults and children not eligible for the free vaccine under the National Immunisation Program, though Minister for Health and Aged Care Mark Butler is working to improve Australia's supply chain.
- <u>The Sunday Times</u> (page 1) reports WA Premier Roger Cook is seeking federal funding to
 increase aged care beds in WA to alleviate hospital ramping, while the new Aged Care Act has
 been delayed until November.
