

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The Australian Financial Review (page 1) reports the Department of Health has warned Health Minister Mark Butler of looming "funding cliffs" that are forecast to reduce its budget by 38 per cent in coming years, which would affect a hundred programs and require the consideration of cuts to service delivery and jobs.
- <u>The Sydney Morning Herald</u> (page 1) reports hospital staff in NSW are reporting a significant rise in physical assaults, a rise of 62 per cent in some areas, attributing the increase to long emergency department waits and a lack of public mental health services.
- The Courier Mail (page 1) reports whistleblowers have claimed that disabled people on the National Disability Insurance Scheme are being "traded like commodities" for thousands of dollars, with providers paying for referrals from "consultants" who profit from a black market targeting those with the largest NDIS plans.
- The Geelong Advertiser (page 1) reports that despite pleading with residents to take advantage of alternate care options, paramedics in Geelong are frequently being diverted to non-emergency cases which contribute to ambulance ramping and a worsening crisis in the state's busiest region for Code 1 emergencies.
- <u>The Hobart Mercury</u> (page 1) reports the National Allergy Council has launched a new national online training program to address significant gaps in food allergy training for childcare

workers across Australia, as there are currently no consistent national requirements for this type of training.

- The Courier Mail (page 1) reports as part of a "Fertility Unpacked" panel, actor Olympia
 Valance has advocated for more in-depth fertility education in schools, a call supported by
 medical specialists who note many young people are uneducated about the challenges of
 conceiving and are shocked when they have issues.
- <u>The Guardian</u> (online) reports community-based initiatives like the Outback Mind men's circles
 are providing a preventative approach to men's mental health care in regional and rural
 Australia, and helping to quell feelings of isolation.

Nightmare of attacks on hospital workers
