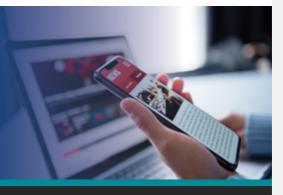

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- <u>The Courier Mail</u> (page 1) reports that a veteran in his forties died by suicide on Anzac Day at Toowoomba Hospital's Acute Mental Health Unit, with Queensland's state coroner investigating how the man could have taken his own life in a facility designed for his protection.
- <u>The Saturday Age</u> (page 1) reports the NDIA has repaid more then \$145,000 to 26 participants, and could be facing \$3 million in payments to service providers, after a review of its debt policies found a slew of errors due to "poor processes amnd human error".
- <u>The Saturday Age</u> (page 2) reports a coronial inquest has Dr Raad Hassan did not follow correct procedures in the lead up to the death of a toddler he had conducted a circumcision on, with the coroner finding the death could have been prevented, while doctors are calling for greater regulation following the incident.
- <u>The Courier Mail</u> (page 3) reports that Queensland hospitalisation rates for influenza patients have reached a new peak due to low vaccination rates, placing significant pressure on the public health system.
