

- Adelaide Advertiser (page 6) reports the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare found nearly 90 per cent of veterans who died by suicide between 2010 and 2020 had accessed health services in the year before their deaths, with its defence unit head Paul Pham saying the data will inform suicide prevention efforts.  Aldred and Michael McCormack have urged action on the \$5bn illicit tobacco trade, calling for a
 pause on excise hikes and stronger enforcement, while other MPs warned against cutting
