

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The Australian Financial Review (page 18) reports that new guidance published by the
 Australian Health Practitioner Regulation Agency on Tuesday includes a list of "good telehealth
 practices", including the recommendation that doctors should first assess a patient in person
 before writing a prescription, coming the wake of Health Minister Mark Butler asking the
 medicines regulator in May to consider how to regulate the industry.
- <u>Disability Support Guide (online)</u> reports that Federal Health, Aged Care and Disability
 Minister Mark Butler has said that \$4.4 million in federal funding for disability employment
 provider Bedford would ensure that jobs and services continue during its sale process, which is
 expected to take place throughout October.
- The Hobart Mercury (page 1) reports that an Older Persons Advocacy Network review found
 that overwhelmed hospitals are placing elderly patients in hotels while they wait for aged care
 beds, and some residential facilities are refusing those with mental illness or dementia. while
 the report also raised concerns about the Federal Government's new Single Assessment
 System, aimed to simplify access to aged care services, saying contractors lacked training and
 were providing wrong information.
- <u>The Age (page 6)</u> reports that families have expressed concern about the proposed timeline for a new scheme called Thriving Kids that will start replacing NDIS support for thousands of

children in mid 2027, fearing moving to a more standard system of care will create a "one-size-fits-all" approach that will leave children behind.

- The Australian (page 7) reports that the 2025 Health of the Nation Report by the Royal
 Australian College of General Practitioners has found that patients are increasingly asking their
 GPs to treat complex health conditions because they can't afford to pay specialists' fees, with
 GPs saying this has meant that they are seeing patients for longer and that the demands on
 them are more challenging due to a lack of adequate resources.
- The Courier Mail (page 17) reports that a new report has found that nearly one in three GPs had seen racism towards patients in the healthcare system in the past year. while nearly one in five had personally experienced racism from a patient within their practice in the same period and 10 per cent had experienced it from a colleague.
- The Canberra Times (page 7) reports that the Royal Australian College of General Practitioners 2025 Health of the National Report. has found that the ACT has only 91 GPs per 100,000 people, compared to a national average of 113, and has the lowest bulk-billing rates in the country.
- The Age (page 2) reports that following a review into complaints about podiatric surgeons, the Australian Health Practitioner Regulation Agency has announced the practitioners will be forced to rebrand as "surgical podiatrists" from October 2026. "The title change does not alter the standard of care provided but will help guide consumer expectations and allow for informed decision-making," Podiatry Board of Australia chair Kristy Robson said.
