

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The Sunday Canberra Times (page 1) reports a shortage of permanent specialists in Canberra's public health system, particularly in obstetrics and gynaecology, is forcing the ACT government to pay temporary interstate locum doctors up to four times the rate of a local senior doctor to ensure essential 24/7 service.
- <u>The Sunday Telegraph</u> (page 5) reports that questions are being raised about the efficacy and continuation of the pill-testing trial at NSW music festivals after 14 suspected drug overdoses occurred at the Knockout Festival, resulting in five urgent hospital transfers, despite the availability of the drug-checking service.
- The Daily Telegraph Australia (page 3) reports Cancer Council Queensland is facing internal claims from staff that it has been refusing essential services for fifty cancer patients each week due to a lack of funding, despite the organization's CEO denying the allegations.
- The Sunday Age (page 1) reports Victoria's sole mental health hospital for prisoners is eliminating key specialist healthcare roles, raising concerns about compromised care for high-risk psychiatric patients amidst escalating issues of illicit drug abuse and staff injuries within the facility.
- <u>The Sunday Mail Brisbane</u> (page 1) reports the Crime and Corruption Commission is reviewing documents held by Queensland Health regarding the failed appointment of Dr.

Hajkowicz as Chief Health Office after his job was withdrawn following ministerial intervention.

- The Sunday Herald Sun (page 1) reports a ninety-three year old GP has become a new father, which he attributes to an anti-ageing regimen including human growth hormone injections, a practice not supported by the Endocrine Society of Australia. HGH is regulated by the TGA, which primarily approves its use for growth disorders.
- The Sunday Telegraph (page 29) reports the Federal Government's reforms, including mandated 24/7 nursing and care minutes, are addressing high fall rates in residential aged care facilities that experts attribute to insufficient staffing and lack of Allied Health exercise programs, as noted by Minister for Aged Care and Seniors Sam Rae.
- The Australian Today reports the Federal Government's expansion of Urgent Care Clinics is
 proving successful in diverting almost half of patients away from hospital emergency
 departments by providing fully bulk-billed urgent care, according to Minister for Health and
 Ageing, Mark Butler.
