

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- <u>The AFR Weekend</u> (page 1) reports the NDIS now directly employs just over 10,000 people, marking a near doubling of public servants under the Federal Government despite attempts to reduce costs.

 woman against former Australian Breastfeeding Association counsellor Jasmine Sussex will
 proceed to the Queensland Civil and Administrative Tribunal next year, focusing on the safety of
 the expressed fluid and the freedom of speech to critique the practice.
- The Weekend Australian (page 1) reports a critical benchmarking review of The Prince
 Charles Hospital's Heart Transplant Service is set to be publicly released, exposing
 dysfunction, governance failures, and a concerning mortality rate of transplant patients postsurgery.
- The AFR Weekend (page 3) reports new research estimates that at least half a million Australians are taking weight-loss medications monthly, raising equity concerns as almost 50 per cent of users buy the drugs privately at a cost of up to \$600 a month.
- The Herald Sun (page 3) reports a major Victorian hospital's policy to require all Indigenous
 patients be seen within 30 minutes is facing significant backlash, with over 90 per cent of
 nurses believing the policy poses a risk to public health and patient safety. Nurses' Professional

Association of Australia has raised concerns with the AHPRA regarding the ethical dilemma for nurses, calling for clarification on whether staff risk professional sanctions if they follow instructions that undermine clinical judgement and potentially breach the Nursing and Midwifery Board of Australia code of conduct.

- The Courier Mail (page 3) reports the Royal Brisbane and Women's Hospital is currently
 operating without a specialist doctor, leaving over 250 women waiting for vital surgery, which
 highlights significant gender-specific inequities in access to timely care for conditions affecting
 nearly 50 per cent of women who have had children.
- The Weekend Australian (page 5) reports the "bed block crisis" is attributed by Ageing Australia to a substantial funding gap in the aged care sector, necessitating an estimated \$5 billion to \$7 billion annually to fund the 10,000 new aged care beds needed each year for two decades.
- The Sydney Morning Herald (page 25) reports a growing concern among healthcare experts and organisations about the small but increasing trend of "freebirthing," with hospital workers in high-incidence areas reporting an uptick in emergency presentations after complications arise, leading to calls for greater regulation of unregistered birth workers, such as doulas. This practice is fuelled by women's negative experiences of the healthcare system and concerns about birth trauma and what they view as unnecessary intervention, which has led to a divisive national debate regarding maternal autonomy versus infant safety.
- <u>ABC Online</u> reports an internal audit by Queensland Health revealed that a total of 1,022 children born between 2022-2024 have no record of a Newborn Blood Spot (NBS) screening test result, with the Federal Department of Health, Disability, and Ageing interested in the potential for undiagnosed conditions that could cause lifelong disability or early death if not treated early.

Adolescents who were vaccinated against Covid-19 were less likely to develop long Covid after their first SARS-CoV-2 infection than unvaccinated peers, a new study finds. The study, led by the US National Health Institute-funded Recover Initiative, is the first to examine the potential benefits of Covid vaccination in adolescents beyond lowering the severity of initial Covid symptoms.
