

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The Sunday Age (page 3) reports that providing Penthrox as a pain relief option for people receiving an IUD implant is one of the measures to be rolled out as part of the State Government's response to 27 recommendations made by a nation-first inquiry into women's pain to be handed down today. Premier Allan, who instigated the report, said "it's time we stop hearing that our pain doesn't exist" with the relief option part of a wider women's action plan to be developed over the next six months.
- The Sunday Mail Brisbane (page 1) reports that Queensland Premier David Crisafulli has rejected the Federal Government's \$20 billion hospital funding offer, declaring an end to "cannoli diplomacy". Mr Crisafulli said the funding would short-change Queensland by keeping the federal share at 35 per cent instead of the 42.5 per cent agreed in 2023.
- The Sunday Mail Adelaide (page 5) reports that a mental-health patient was left waiting in the Flinders Medical Centre's emergency department for five nights due to ramping and a lack of beds.
- <u>The Sunday Tasmanian (page 4)</u> reports that following feedback on a new home-birthing model aimed at improving access and safety, the Tasmanian government will consider legislation to tackle unregistered birth workers.
