

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The Australian (page 1) reports that documents obtained under freedom of information laws showed former gender equality ambassador Stephanie Copus Campbell said UN special rapporteur on violence against women and girls, Reem Alsalem, had "taken a fairly difficult position on transgender rights in a way that doesn't conform with our views" and they were dealing with those concerns. Ms Alsalem said governments are entitled to disagree with them, but must not undermine their independence and work.
- The Australian (page 4) reports that Assistant Minister for Women and Health Rebecca White
 has announced 11 new federally funded, bulk-billed endometriosis clinics opening early next
 year in NSW, Victoria, Queensland and WA. Ms White said the clinics "are about dignity, early
 intervention and better outcomes for all women", and Health Minister Mark Butler said these will
 improve access to specialised care for every age.
- The Daily Telegraph (page 5) reports that the number of aged-care beds in Australia increased by 578 last year, below the 800 stated by the Federal Government, with Victoria recording the biggest increase, according to an analysis by Boxwell & Co. the college's governance, alleged misuse of funds and lack of respect from the board.

- <u>The Herald Sun (page 5)</u> reports that almost 900 Ambulance Victoria staff will launch industrial action from Tuesday after more than six months of pay negotiations, with members saying they need a fair wage increase.

 after cases were detected at the recent Oasis concert in Sydney and Jelly Roll concert in
