Health Minister Tim Nicholls has refused to review Queensland Health's suspension process for doctors with decades of experience who say they are being "unfairly" stood down on full pay for months. It comes as The Saturday Courier-Mail revealed taxpayers are paying full salaries to 91 clinicians suspended on full pay with some earning up to \$500,000 a year at the same time Mr Nicholls is "pulling every lever" to hire 46,000 more workers by 2032.

Only 37 per cent of Australian products have Health Star ratings, which falls far short of the government's 70 per cent target, prompting calls for a mandatory system. The federal government is expected to decide next year whether to make these ratings mandatory, despite industry opposition and the voluntary system's flaws. The Australian Food and Grocery Council cites labelling costs as a barrier, while nutrition experts emphasise the importance of updating national policies after 33 years.
