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Not-for-profit disability services are closing due to untenably low price caps, NDIS architect warns

Not-for-profit disability services that support some of the most vulnerable Australians are being forced to close and exit the national disability insurance scheme because of untenably low price caps for NDIS services, one of the architects of the scheme has warned. "For some years, many of us in the sector have been telling the National Disability Insurance Agency that flaws in their pricing are contributing to not-for-profit registered providers of disability services going broke," warned Martin Laverty, who is now the CEO of not-for-profit disability provider Aruma.

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Patients gain back lost weight after stopping obesity jab, study shows

A peer-reviewed study has found 82 per cent of Mounjaro patients regained at least a quarter of their lost weight, and reversed some of their associated health gains, after stopping the drug.

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People who stop using Mounjaro tend to regain weight and lose other health benefits, says study

New drugs for CF, multiple myeloma
