

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The Australian Financial Review (page 1) reports financial data from various departments indicate significant challenges from unbudgeted staff expenses alongside warnings about looming "funding cliffs" from expiring programs. The brief to Health Minister Mark Butler highlighted the Department's budget is forecast to decline \$797 million by 2027, with its departmental funding expected to be down by 38 per cent by 2028.
- The Australian (page 4) reports state ministers have criticised the Federal Government after figures revealed only 802 new residential aged-care beds were delivered in the last financial year, a steep drop from the average annual demand of over 10,000. Aged Care and Seniors Minister Sam Rae said the Federal Government has invested \$1 billion to upgrade services and facilities, including \$300 million in capital grants to pump more beds into the sector.
- The Age (page 1) reports Australia's illegal tobacco cartel has allegedly joined forces with a Chinese crime gang to control the local illicit vape market, forcing retailers to sell the Alibarbar brand, which has caught the TGA and ABF off guard as they do not track seized illicit brand identities. A spokesperson for the Therapeutic Goods Administration confirmed that "More than 12 million illegal vapes... have been taken off the streets by the ABF and TGA since January 2024," and Minister for Health Mark Butler has previously stated the government is up against both Big Tobacco and "serious organised crime that is determined to continue to make money from these very dangerous products."

- <u>The Herald Sun</u> (page 3) reports a Royal Melbourne Hospital-led study demonstrated that women with breast cancer who had regular screening were more likely to survive, with their risk of dying cut by a "staggering 70 per cent," and required "significantly" less intense treatment.
- The Burnie Advocate (page 3) reports the Federal Government has tripled the bulk billing incentive payment for general practitioners, with the goal of increasing bulk-billing rates to nine out of ten GP visits by 2030. The measure has already encouraged some clinics to move to fully bulk-billed appointments, and is part of the Albanese government's almost \$800 million Women's Health Package which also adds new oral contraceptives and menopausal hormone therapies to the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme.
- <u>The Hobart Mercury</u> (page 1) reports the Health and Community Services Union (HACSU)
 plans to escalate industrial action from Wednesday, following stalled negotiations over wages
 and conditions.
- <u>The Northern Territory News</u> (page 1) reports NT Health chief executive Chris Hosking informed a forum that federal funding negotiations for private maternity services in the NT are "hopefully moving forward," after the closure of the private maternity ward this year. Federal Health Minister Mark Butler is reportedly "not agreeable to \$35m" requested for modifications to Royal Darwin Hospital's maternity ward but is "agreeable to a more moderate estimate."
- <u>The Australian</u> (page 3) reports medical leaders and patient advocates are demanding the full release of a confidential report revealing that Brisbane's Prince Charles Hospital's heart transplant program had a mortality rate 50 per cent higher than the international average, raising concerns that dysfunction may "overload" already strained interstate heart transplant facilities in Victoria and New South Wales.
- The Canberra Times (page 4) reports that voluntary assisted dying is now available in the ACT, with aged care homes required to comply with legislation that prevents them from refusing residents access. The requirements, which include displaying the VAD policy and passing on contact details to the navigation service within two working days, contrast with a September report suggesting some people in aged care homes have been denied access elsewhere due to facility refusal or other restrictions.
- The Herald Sun (page 7) reports Ambulance Victoria issued a "code orange" alert due to an "overwhelming demand" for emergency transport over the weekend, with operational workload increasing by more than 100 additional cases than expected.
