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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- **[The Sydney Morning Herald](#)** (page 8) reports that Health and Disability Minister Mark Butler announced on Tuesday that states and territories will deliver the new Thriving Kids program, aimed to support children with autism or developmental delays outside the NDIS. Mr Butler said the Federal Government will fund the scheme through the state governments, and it won't be a "traditional Medicare-funded allied health professional visit, that might be bulk billed".
- **[The Daily Telegraph](#)** (page 3) reports that the Burnet Institute's annual survey of about sexual health, drug use, mental health and wellbeing among people aged between 15-29 found that while rates of drinking were down, hard drug consumption and addictive behaviours like vaping had increased, and respondents also reported lacking basic, practical sexual health education.
- **[The Herald Sun](#)** (page 1) reports that the cost of IVF treatment in Victoria is rising steeply, with an analysis of the prices charged at over 100 clinics revealing that some clinics have increased fees by as much as \$900.
- **[The Herald Sun](#)** (page 10) reports that industry experts welcomed the announcement of allowing trained GPs to diagnose and prescribe treatment for ADHD to reduce wait times and cost of specialist care, however they said it is not a quick fix for all the gaps and the opposition criticised its delay.
