- **[The Sunday Telegraph](#)** (page 5) reports Minister for Health and Ageing Mark Butler is overseeing the rollout of the Childhood Immunisation Campaign and the Winter Vaccination Campaign to improve childhood immunisation coverage after data showed vaccination rates for two-year-olds have failed the 95 per cent target for the sixth consecutive year.
- **[The Sunday Mail Brisbane](#)** (page 8) reports the Federal Government is being urged to facilitate more discharge pathways for over 1400 long-stay patients who remain in Queensland hospitals waiting to access the NDIS or aged care accommodation. While ramping figures show a recent reduction to 37.7 per cent, individual wait times at major facilities have exceeded seven hours.
- **[The Sunday Telegraph](#)** (page 3) reports the NDIA has implemented an inactive plan manager initiative to prevent criminals from using dormant service providers to defraud the NDIS after a man allegedly claimed more than 1.5 million dollars in five days.
