## EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- **The Australian** (page 2) reports that average medical specialist fees have jumped 8.1 per cent in a year, double the rate of inflation and despite a heavy public focus on excessive charging in the medical profession. The Grattan Institute's Special Treatment report said almost a million people had delayed or forgone specialist care because of the cost.
- **The Medical Republic** (online) reports that Australia is on track to face a shortage of more than 12,800 full-time equivalent GP and non-GP specialist doctors by 2048, with NSW, Victoria and Queensland set to bear the brunt of the shortages according to a new report by the Department of Health, Disability and Ageing.
- The **Sydney Morning Herald** (page 8) reports that an open letter, signed by the Royal Australian College of General Practitioners, the Australian Medical Association, the Australian College of Nurse Practitioners, and the chief executive of Choice Chemist, has spoken out against what it calls a lack of oversight of the move that has given pharmacists the power to prescribe medications, saying it puts patients at risk of complications.
- The **Herald Sun** (page 18) reports that the bowel cancer mortality rate among Australians aged 50-74 has nearly halved in the 20 years since the National Bowel Cancer Screening Program was launched. The Australian Institute of Health and Welfare says those who take part in the program are more likely to have bowel cancer detected at an earlier stage, improving their chances of survival. *Also reported by: [West Australian](#)*

- [The Age](#) (page 14) reports an international team of researchers led by the Doherty Institute in Melbourne found the standard frontline antibiotic used for decades should no longer be the default treatment to fight golden staph infections, which kills 1000 Australians every year. The antibiotic carries a lower survival rate and elevated risk of severe side effects compared to alternatives.
